
Holiday Happenings

Historical Facts:

It's not a map, it's called a nautical chart. Charts are the opposite of road maps. A road map shows you where you can go; charts show you where you cannot go. Most charts are in nautical miles. A nautical mile is

6,076 feet and a statute mile is 5,280 feet. On every chart is a compass rose. It has two rings, the outside ring denotes true cardinal directions while the smaller ring denotes magnetic cardinal directions. Charts are in color: White designates deep, safe water, blue, shallow water; and green, tidal water at high tide. Gold or tan shows dry land. Ask the Captain to show you a chart of the local waters. There is much more information on a chart which we will discuss in the next Newsletter.

Wherever the Wind Takes Us [Ken Partridge]

Our club's newest member, Capt. Redeye (Bob Martschinske) waited patiently on Sunday morn, the 11th of December as his crew assembled to assist him in getting his 34' Gemini Cat out to sea. At approximately 11:30am the cat motored west from Nervous Nellie's dock, through the channel markers and then headed south under a partly sunny sky with a good wind and a happy crew consisting of Mary

Burch, Joanie Kachel, Ann Lieberman, Charlene McGill, Johnny Kalisik, Ken Plourde (Ken 2) and yours truly, Ken Partridge (Ken 3).

Destination: "Wherever the wind takes us" said Capt. Redeye, when asked.

Following our initial excitement (well, maybe just mine, since it was my first sail as part of a crew) we (I) settled down and experienced smooth sailing as

we passed familiar scenery on Fort Myers Beach, Lover's Key, Bonita Springs and approached North Naples.

Every person on board had the opportunity to work the lines and sheets and took his or her turn at the helm. Joanie was the first crew member to take the wheel and responded well to the Captain's Socratic method of teaching in reversing our course and headed us away from the rain to the south. Everyone of us successfully executed the course homeward, keeping the cat at a 60 degree angle into the wind; except for Charlene who went for the gold and had us sailing at a 90 degree angle with winds escalating to

16 knots. A light rain finally caught up to us, but never posed a problem.

Capt. Redeye took over the wheel again as we approached our home port, and guided the cat to it's berth with skill and ease at approximately 5:30pm. We then infiltrated the 2nd floor of Nervous Nellie's and commenced to cheerfully socialize, heartily consume grog and vittles, and happily stabilize our sea legs.

All in all, it was a terrific day; complete with important tips and sail building skills thanks to our more experienced crew and attentive Captain, and an enjoyable socializing experience. Many thanks and best wishes to all participants. ~ Ken Partridge

A Sailor's Dictionary [Capt. Bob Weisman]



SAIL TRIM: Whatever point of sail you are on, it's important to trim your sails as cleanly as possible. A proper shape is as similar to an airplane wing as you can get the sail. In order to accomplish this we have several controls. On the stay sail, there is the halyard, the leech line, and the sheet traveler block.

On the main, there's the halyard and/or the downhaul (or cunningham), the outhaul, the leech line, the mainsheet, the traveler, and (if you have it) the backstay adjuster. Each point of sail and different wind and sea condition require different trimming, but rather try to memorize what position each control should be in, you should learn the proper shape the sail should be and what to do with each control in order to produce that shape.

I like to say at this point in my sailing lessons that the stay sail is a lifting sail and the main is a driving sail while the boat is on a reach, but when on a run, everything is reversed because the sails are not acting as airfoils but rather reverse airfoils and the

staysail becomes a driving sail and the main becomes a lifting sail. Because of this, the controls are also used in the opposite way (rather than tightening the sheets to go faster, you ease them out, etc).

The main sheet controls the amount off center the boom lies. The outhaul controls the amount of draft in the bottom of the sail. The backstay adjuster controls the mast bend and thus the flatness of the sail. The traveler controls the twist of the sail. The leech line takes the flutter out of the leech of the sail. And the downhaul (or cunningham, or the halyard) controls the position of the draft.

On the staysail, the sheet traveler block position controls the draft of the sail and at the same time it's twist. The sheets control the position of the sail relative to the wind (or boat).

Next month I'll go into the mechanics of operating the controls to get that clean sail shape that make sailing not only faster but also much easier and safer.
